Peter Pettit

The Reverend **Peter A. Pettit**, Ph.D., co-director of New Paths: Christians Engaging Israel (a program of the Shalom Hartman Institute), is director of the Institute for Jewish-Christian Understanding and Associate Professor of Religion Studies at Muhlenberg College in Allentown, PA. A Lutheran minister (ELCA), he has been affiliated with the Hartman Institute theology conference since its inception in 1984 and continues to serve on its planning team. He has held residential fellowships at the Hebrew University, American Jewish University, and the Oxford Centre for Hebrew and Jewish Studies. His research and teaching focus on the hermeneutics of self-understanding in the Jewish and Christian communities. He has authored several curriculum resources for interfaith encounter.

Dr. **Marcie Lenk** is a Shalom Hartman Institute research fellow, the institute's Director of Christian Leadership Programs and Co-Director of New Paths: Christians Engaging Israel. She received her Ph.D. at Harvard University with a dissertation entitled, *The Apostolic Constitutions: Judaism and Anti-Judaism in the Construction of Christianity.* For more than two decades she has taught Early Christianity, Hebrew Bible, and Rabbinic Literature at institutions such as Boston University and City College of NY, as well as at Jewish and Christian seminaries in Israel and the United States.
