## Integrated and Intentional: Bringing New Modalities into the Religion and Theology Classroom

The use of technology, the arts, service learning and other modalities are not new to religious and theological education, but the recent global pandemic has highlighted both the opportunities and challenges of using integrated approaches in the classroom. Although courses have traditionally included activities outside the residential classroom, the current health crisis has redefined "inside" and "outside," and in some cases has shattered that boundary. Even those classrooms that had already incorporated new modalities have had to adapt and/or rethink in the midst of such changes.

What new kinds of modalities are made possible by today's learning environments, and what strategies are teachers and learners developing to make the most of these experiences? How do technology, the arts, service learning, or other integrated approaches help and/or hinder the construction of new knowledge and formation? How do these integrated modalities respond to the current public health crisis?

Teaching Theology & Religion invites essays of from 4,000 to 7,000 words related to international and intercultural pedagogies. All submissions will be peer-reviewed.
